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The June Family



A trip to the ER is not what any kid hopes for on their birthday. On Hayden's 12th birthday—that she shares with twin sister, Cameron—her parents knew something was seriously wrong. Their active, young daughter wasn't getting better from what they originally thought was the flu. Hayden wouldn't get out of bed, even for her favorite breakfast or to open birthday presents.

Ethan and Erika, Hayden's dad and mom, borrowed a pulse oximeter from family and discovered Hayden's oxygen levels were dangerously low. They rushed her to Midland Memorial Hospital. The hospital knew that Hayden would need more care than they could provide and arranged a flight crew to bring her to Covenant Children's Hospital in Lubbock.

"She had severe pneumonia, one of the worst they'd seen in a child," Erika recalled. Erika and Ethan went to Lubbock while Cameron stayed with her grandparents in Midland.

The June Family were originally told to expect to stay in Lubbock 5-7 days, so Erika booked a hotel room. But, after a few days, Hayden wasn't getting any better. Then, Hayden's condition became

critical. Hayden was put into a medically induced coma so she could be put on an ECMO machine to work as a lung bypass and keep her breathing.

That's when RMHC of the Southwest came in to help. It was hard for Ethan and Erika to leave the hospital to sleep or shower, even before Hayden was put on ECMO. Erika remembers thinking at the time, "I can't leave my daughter. There's no way." Erika and Ethan were able to stay just a few floors down from Hayden in a sleep room at the Ronald McDonald Family Room.

The June Family were relieved to have a comfortable bed, a shower, and the ability to do laundry while remaining close to their daughter. The sleep room also gave Ethan and Erika a place where they could process the experience they were going through. "We sat in there and we cried. It was the first night we got to sit and talk about how we were really feeling in our own protective area," Erika said.



Tears of sadness were able to turn into tears of joy. After 3 long weeks, Hayden was able to come off ECMO and breathe on her own. Her recovery was a miracle. After 61 days in the

ICU, she was able to walk out of the hospital with her family.

To our community of supporters, Erika wanted to share, "Being there and not having to leave Hayden's side, helped her. She felt her loved ones around her. And, you gave that to us."

Hayden will have long lasting effects from her illness, but she isn't letting that stop her from getting back to what she loves. She is back to playing volleyball and being a being a typical preteen girl with her family still close at her side.



Hayden and her family were able to be together during this unimaginable time thanks to you.
